

What does "aretê" mean?




Sisterhood







Chapter Financial Obligations

New Member Semester

- Range from \$525-\$675
- Includes many one time fees – initiation fee, new member fee, etc.

Initiated Semesters

- Range from \$315-\$400
- Chapters may have additional costs for apparel, events, etc.
